“Thank you,” said Tom. “I must have fallen asleep.”

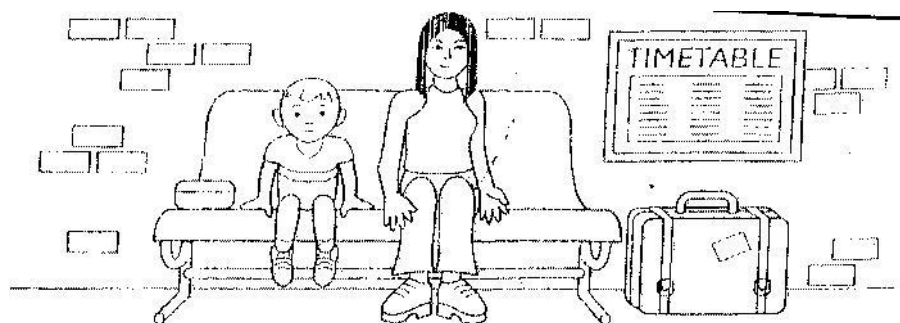
When the train stopped, Tom could see his grandmother and grandfather waiting for him. His grandmother kissed him while his grandfather went to thank the ticket collector for looking after him.

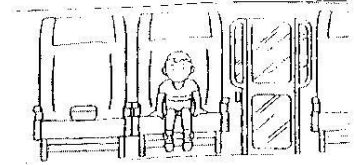

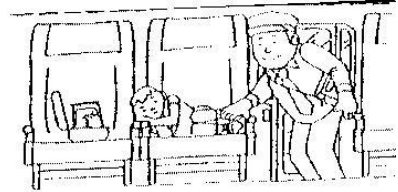
The writing and pictures below tell you again what happens in the story. Number the sentences and pictures in the order in which they happen in the story you have read. The first one and the last one have been done for you.

Story Writing

We ask the girls to write in a variety of styles. Their stories should be well-structured with a beginning, middle and an end. This applies to all styles of writing. The use of language and vocabulary is important. We are looking for interesting vocabulary, not all of which will be spelt accurately. Girls will not be penalised for incorrect spelling.

Time allowed for the story is 40 minutes.

We help the girls by giving them instructions like these:

- ◆ *In your story we would like you to write TWO diary entries telling us about the first two days of a holiday.*
- ◆ *This can be real or imaginary.*
- ◆ *Don't forget to tell us where you went, whom you were with and what you did.*
- ◆ *What sort of things do people write down in a diary?*
- ◆ *Make good use of your senses*
 - *Sight*
 - *Hearing*
 - *Smell*
 - *Taste*
 - *Touch*
