SECTION A

Read the story and answer the questions. **Help is given with the vocabulary in the list at the end of the paper (pages 6 and 7) – make sure to use it.**

1. *Philippus, rex Macedoniae, filium habebat, nomine Alexander.* (line 1) What do we find out about Philip here? [2 marks]
2. *olim puer cum patre sedebat prope regiam in campo. ibi Philippus equos emebat.* (lines 1-2) where were Philip and Alexander? what were they doing? [3 marks]
3. *equus magnus et mirabilis propter formam capitis in campo ductus est* (line 3). What do we find out about the horse's appearance here? [3 marks]
4. *equus caput quasi iuveni aut bovis habebat* (lines 3-4). What was strange about the shape of the horse's head? [2 marks]
5. *equus tam acer et ferox erat ut omnes milites timerent* (line 4). How did the soldiers feel about the horse, and why? [3 marks]
6. *equus mordebat, fremebat, surgebat; nemo eum placare poterat.* (lines 4-5). How was the horse behaving and what was the issue about its behaviour? [3 marks]
7. *rex iussit milites equo appropinquare, sed etiam milites fortissimi nolebant. equus nullum militem portare volebat.* (line 5). How did the King and soldiers react? [3 marks]

8. *rex erat iratus. "equus malus est" inquit; "emere nolo."* (line 6). How did the King feel and what did he decide? [3 marks]
9. *Alexander autem equum amabat. "hic equus optimus est" inquit; "ego ipse eum emere volo. non est malus."* (lines 7-8). What did Alexander feel and say about the horse? [4 marks]
10. *rex ridebat.* (line 9). How did his father respond? [1 mark]
11. *"quod pecuniam non habes" inquit "si eum placare potes, equum tibi dabo."* (line 9) what did Alexander's father say he would do, and why? [3 marks]
12. Give an example of a verb in the IMPERFECT tense in line 1. [1 mark]
13. Explain the case of "regiam" in line 2 [1 mark]
14. Give an example of a noun in the GENITIVE case in line 3. [1 mark]
15. Give the First Person Singular Present Tense of "poterat" in line 5. [1 mark]
16. Give an example of a Pronoun in line 8. [1 mark]
17. Give the Positive (basic form) of "optimus" in line 8. [1 mark]
18. For each Latin word in the table below, give an English word derived from the Latin word, and explain the relationship. The first line is done for you as an example. [4 marks]
